Dear All Saints',

Thank you for your prayers while I have been on my travels. They have been gratefully appreciated. I arrived back very early on Friday morning and am still recovering! I hope to give a short insight into the trip on Sunday morning and am thinking about doing a full presentation one Sunday afternoon soon. I'm sure that there will also be many stories appearing in sermons over the next few months. It's been a fantastic experience and has certainly been thought provoking. We were warmly welcomed by the Ghanaians and they really appreciated the gifts that we were able to give which included laptops, drums and brass instruments, chairs and a photocopier. We visited an orphanage, 2 schools, Methodist headquarters, 2 village chiefs and several churches. There was a lot that was very different, but there was also a sense of unity with all the Methodists that we met and it was really good to see their energy and pride in the church and their desire to serve God.

Many of you will be reading this on Saturday which is Holocaust Memorial Day. One of the most emotional moments of our trip to Ghana was visiting Cape Coast Castle which was used in the slave trade. To hear the stories of the horrendous way that these people were treated was very sobering. It is difficult to remember that we did not learn our lesson and that this was followed by the Holocaust and that there have been other genocides since, with some arguing that it is happening in Gaza today. Cape Coast Castle was however, also a place of hope. A plaque on the wall says this: "In everlasting memory of the anguish of our ancestors. May those who died rest in peace. May those who return find their roots, may humanity never again perpetrate such injustice against humanity. We, the living vow to uphold this." The people who placed that plaque have now died, but their vow comes down to us. We have our differences, but we share so much as humans. Every human is a child of God and deserves respect. It is so important that we show that in the way we live our lives day by day.

On Sunday we have our Covenant service as we renew our covenant with God. As we prepare for that service, I've printed below the words of the covenant prayer that we will be saying. What do those words mean to you as you come to this service this year?

I am no longer my own but yours.

Your will, not mine, be done in all things, wherever you may place me,

in all that I do and in all that I may endure;

when there is work for me and when there is none;

when I am troubled and when I am at peace.

Your will be done

when I am valued and when I am disregarded;

when I have all things, and when I have nothing.

I willingly offer

all I have and am to serve you, as and where you choose.
