#### Dear All Saints',



With the starting of the roof works I've been reflecting quite a bit on the church as a building, but this week we celebrate Pentecost, often known as the birthday of the church. Church in this context is clearly not the building, but the people, the community who gather week by week in worship. Birthdays are an opportunity to celebrate and give thanks for a particular person, a day when we remember what they mean to us. As we celebrate Pentecost this week, perhaps it's an opportunity to celebrate what the church means to us, what we value about it.

From the first days of Christianity, Christians have gathered together. Jesus gave the example by gathering together his 12 disciples, and these and other disciples who followed Jesus during his life continued to gather after his death, his resurrection and his

ascension, praying together as they waited, as Jesus had told them to do. On the day of Pentecost with the coming of the Holy Spirit, Luke tells us in Acts that 3000 were added to their number and that "they devoted themselves to the apostle's teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers". We don't do much different today - we continue to pray, to celebrate communion, to listen to the Bible readings and hear reflections on them and spend time socially together.

It's one of the things that we may value about the church, that link with those who have gone before. For centuries, in all sorts of different ways, people have gathered as the church to pray, to share bread and wine, to read the Bible and reflect on it, to spend time together. We are their descendants and our inheritance is the rich variety of prayers, hymns, writings and reflections that we can access today, alongside the knowledge of their prayers for us and the world and our continued connection with them, the 'communion of saints' as it is often called.

We are also part of a worldwide church. As I have said before, it was one of the things that I really valued about my time in Ghana, that sense of connection with those in Ghana, through God, that we were brothers and sisters in Christ. We are part of one great big family that spreads across the world. Whenever I sing the hymn 'The day thou gavest' I am struck by the image of the voice of prayer that 'is never silent, not dies the strain of praise away'. As each continent moves into daylight so prayers and praise continue as God's people bring their worship. We are part of something so much bigger.

But we are also part of something much smaller, and perhaps the value of the church for you is focussed on the local and our church at All Saints. What do you value about All Saints? The people, the fellowship, the worship, the history, the music, the environment? Perhaps a mixture of several, perhaps something else. How could we celebrate what All Saints means to us?

Whatever comes into our minds when we think about 'church', we are here because the Holy Spirit joins us together, the Holy Spirit whose coming we celebrate at Pentecost, the Holy Spirit who sends us out of our church buildings to share the good news of God's kingdom with the world. We gather, but we are then sent, not in our own power, but in the power of the Holy Spirit, to live and work to God's praise and glory.

Praying for those affected by Climate Change: as part of our EcoChurch journey, the Eco Church resources challenge us to pray for a specific overseas environmental project, alongside the people and places that regular feature in our prayers of intercession. Having done some research, we are proposing that for the next 6 months we pray for Bangladesh and especially for people who live in Bangladesh. Prayers for them will be included in our prayers in church and in the prayer requests in our notices each week.
